**Ask Doctors To Give Old Instruments**

Norwood physicians who are planning to attend the forthcoming convention of the Massachusetts Medical Society in Boston on May 25 and 26 are urged to bring with them their spare or discarded surgical instruments and auxiliary drugs as a sorely-needed contribution to the Medical and Surgical Relief Committee of America, announced Dr. John D. Adams of Boston. Dr. Adams is chairman of the New England division of the Medical and Surgical Relief Committee.  
These salvaged supplies will be rigidly inspected by experts and, if reconditioned, if necessary. Finally explained Dr. Adams, they will be used to equip emergency medical sets and operating kits that the Medical and Surgical Relief Committee donates to auxiliary and naval units of America and her Allies, to war zone nurseries, needy hospitals and civilian defense groups throughout the free world.

The Medical and Surgical Relief Committee will be represented at the meeting of the Medical Society by an active group of Boston physicians under the supervision of Mrs. Henry Framar of Natick, Mass., announced Dr. Adams. Mrs. Framar and her assistants have generously volunteered to sell embryos, distribute literature and select donations of instruments and medicines at the Committee's booth during the two-day convention at the Hotel Statler.

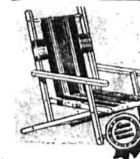

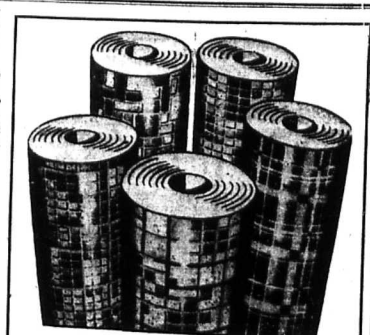

(The use of library book collections at the Balch School has increased since Branch Library was established across the street. Reading service stimulates more reading.)  
A master of the old Balch School building and pictures of the pupils enrolled in 1910 had a good share of attention this evening.  
The Norwood Historical Society, represented by Mr. Harold Gay, presented an exhibit of South Norwood's early history. Mrs. William Upham, fascinating scrapbooks and pictorial histories of the neighborhood, and Mr. W. W. Everett who is both a member of the Norwood Historical Society, and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Morrill School Library, lent many photographs of South Norwood in 1880 and 1890. Great interest was shown in these pictures of early history of the area. Those attending Open House, especially the young people, some of whom may not have seen before what their part of Norwood was like in the early days.

**OPEN HOUSE**  
Families of South Norwood boys and girls in the service were invited to send their photographs or a place of special honor at the Open House. Among those who attended was one of the four Kelley boys, all in the service.  
One of the guests attending the Open House, who lives in another part of town, said it was the first time she had visited Norwood's new library. She expressed interest and commendation in the choice of books and magazines—advanced and commending the job of relationship to the interest, the job—advancement, the patriotic service and the recreation of the readers it serves.  
Among the guests were a number of representatives of the Board of Library Trustees and staff, the president of the Norwood Women's Community Committee, and a member of the Morrill School faculty. Other local organizations represented were St. George's Syrian Orthodox Church, Miss Gertrude Hennings, Librarian of the Walpole Public Library, was also among the honored guests.
