Up To 5-Week Delay Seen In Annual Town Meeting

Timetable Running Same As Last Year

A delay of four to five weeks in the date of Norwood's Annual Town Meeting appeared unavoidable this week as the Finance Commission continued its 1965 municipal budget deliberations.

The Finance Commission is followed, it would be approximately the same as last year. The 1964 annual meeting started on April 23rd and was completed at the fourth session on May 4th.

Chairman Hefferan said it was too early to come up with any overall total on the size of the budget which will be recommended. However, he said he was hopeful that the picture would be much clearer after the meeting tonight.

Taxpayers face another moderate rise in the rate for 1965. Lacking final figures, estimates of the size of the tax increase for this year range between \$2 and \$4 per thousand valuation. Last year the rate increased \$2 to \$69.

Mother Of 2 Dies In Auto Accident

Funeral services were held Monday morning in Newtonville for Mrs. Barbara (Barry) Salvucci, 22, of 63 Adams street, Norwood, mother of two small children, killed in a highway accident in Norwood early last Friday morning. Her death was the second highway fatality in Norwood this year, both of them involving a single car and with the occupants alone at the time.

Mrs. Salvucci was buried from the Valente Funeral Home, 697 Washington street, Newtonville, at 9:00 a. m. with Requiem High Mass for the deceased at the Sacred Heart Church, Newton Centre, at 10:00 a. m.

The accident that took the life of Mrs. Salvucci occurred at 2:35 a. m. Friday morning in front of the Norwood Arena. First inking that an accident had occurred was a telephone call to the police from Donald Lawrence of 10 Clark street, who spotted the wrecked car in front of the entrance to the arena. Patrolman Joseph Flaherty answered the call and on arriving at the scene found the woman lying on the ground beside her car partially wedged under the rocker panel. Unable to free her, Patrolman Flaherty radioed for help and a cruiser from Wal-

cott, Mass., arrived. Mrs. Salvucci was pronounced dead at the scene. She was 42 years old. Her husband, Joseph, is a painter. She was a member of the Holy Family Church, Newton Centre.

Sales In County Jump 40 Percent In 5 Years

Norfolk County's 3,743 retail establishments had \$756.6 million in sales in 1963, an increase of 40 percent over 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 Census of Business. The last previous Business Census conducted by the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.
