blue line that was right on target and Norwood had the win.

Besides the ever present Angelo, Tom Smelstor was again impressive as he turned back 17 Tech shots. He has allowed only two goals in the first three tourney games. Norwood's rugged defenseman, Tim Twomey, also played a fine game with his usual brushing checks and great defensive work. The most improved player on the Norwood team is defenseman Jack Cronin, a freshman, who has shown bright in all games. For Boston Tech, about the only bright spot was Steve Cederechuk, who showed a blazing blue line slap shot which kept Norwood goal tender Tom Smelstor on his toes all during the game.

The game was marred by penalties with 11 being called for on Norwood. Hehner, Norwoods ace forward, was called for four trips to the brig and this hampered his effectiveness.

The game got off to a slow start as neither team had any real chances. Captain Maus had an early opportunity but his shot deflected into the crowd. Twomey went to the brig at 1:54 but Norwood carried the play with Bob Clifford and Jack Cronin shining. Tom Smelstor came up with a couple of beauties on Cederechuk and Matanes at the five minute mark.

Hehner and Cederechuk swapped penalties at 4:33 and 5:04 but neither team could penetrate. Twomey had a nice slap shot with Jack Cronin

assisting but Flaherty kicked it out. Norwood finally broke the ice as Bob Donahue, who had just come on, fed Hehner who rifled a shot which Flaherty saved but the rebound went right on Paul Angelo's stick and Paul rifled a waste high shot right by Flaherty's glove side and Norwood had 10 lead at 6:04.

The rest of the period was even with Smelstor making dandy on Whooten at the buzzer.

In the second period, the first three minutes were marred by penalties. Hehner went to the brig at 48 seconds but Tech's Whooten and Norwood's Twomey followed him in short order. In the three minute penalty span, Captain Maus and Angelo combined but Angie just missed the corner. Hehner was sent flying into the air on a check by Whooten, who went to the cage for tripping. With the game still fairly even Bill Crowley hit Twomey with a neat pass but Flaherty saved. Bob Donahue fed Bill Hasenfuss but Billy missed the far corner. The hustling Angelo then came to the rescue as he took a neat pass from Blaine Maus and elicited the Tech net, going around back and tucking the puck into the opposite side for a 2-0 Norwood lead.

Norwood-Newton Roundup

The game will be played in the Boston Garden which has a 13,909 seating capacity, so the overflow crowd which was turned away at the Arena Monday night shouldn't have much trouble getting seats so long as they arrive a little early. The big attraction, Melrose, which was almost given up for as the best favorite in history, is no longer in competition. Norwood and Newton both finished second in their leagues. The Lo-Seniors completed the season in second place behind undefeated Walpole with a record of 9-2-2. Newton was also second place, finishing behind undefeated but once tied Arlington with a record of 10-1-2. The Norwood attack is paced by a high-scoring first wave of Seniors Captain Blaine Maus and Paul Angelo and Judgy Richey Hehner. Newton has the Tourney's top scorer in Dick Toomey, who wears No. 16 and was able to stop Toomey was also the team's leading scorer for the second straight year. Norwood's Blaine Maus led the Bay State League in scoring with Richey Hehner runner-up. Both teams boast a solid defenseman with Norwood having a great one in Tim Twomey and Newton a hard hitter in Bob Toomey, brother of Dick. Norwood appears to have a real edge in the goal with Tom Smelstor allowing only two goals in the tourney. The Newton goalie, Kevin McLaughlin, came up with the game of the tournament in stopping Melrose and will be tough. The Norwood second line has some of the best last two games with some great hustle and will have to give it everything to stop Newton's high-scoring second wave led by Jeff McLaughlin.

Norwood has topped Lynnfield 2-1, Columbus 3-0, and Tech 3-1, while Newton belted Masconomet 12-1, Mal-

den Catholic 5-2 and Melrose 2-1. The final round will take place at the Boston Garden Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. with the winner being crowned state champ. This is Norwood's first trip to the Garden. Newton has made three trips to North Station rink.

Test for Peace Corps Set For Mar. 13 in Brockton

An opportunity for Norwood area residents to test their aptitudes for Peace Corps service will come at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, March 13, at the Brockton Post Office Building.

The opportunity is the Peace Corps Placement Test. It is not passed or failed, but simply indicates where a person's greatest potential lies. The Peace Corps Questionnaire, which must be filled out and brought to the exam unless previously submitted, tells what an applicant has done in the past. But the placement test is aimed at showing what he or she can do in the future. Applicants do not have to register for the test ahead of time.

The Peace Corps Questionnaire can be obtained at all Post Offices. On college campuses, they are available at college placement centers or the offices of Peace Corps Liaison officers, who are members of the faculty or college administration. Or they may be obtained by writing the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

There are two parts to the Peace Corps Placement Test: a general aptitude test and a modern language aptitude test (for which knowledge of a foreign language is not necessary). Applicants should plan on about one and a half hours at the testing center, which they wish to take the Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.

Maus Paces Win Over Columbus

The Norwood High Hockey team ousted their second league champs from the State Tourney as they topped Christopher Columbus High Thursday night at the Boston Arena, 3-0. In the first round of the tournament, the Wheelermens had defeated the Dual County

Norwood Captain Blaine Maus was the big gun as he scored two goals and set up the other scored by Richey Hehner.

The Wheelermens were in a scoreless deadlock but erupted late in the second period as they scored all their goals in one minute and 30 seconds in this one. At 9:27 of the second period Captain Blaine Maus took a perfect pass from Paul Angelo and scored for a 1-0 lead. At 9:42 of the third period, it was Richey Hehner with Maus and Angelo assisting and then less than a minute later the Norwood Captain scored again and Norwood had the game.

The contest had extra significance in that the team wanted to win it for Bob Stewart, who had broken an ankle during the opening over Lynnfield. After the game Norwood Captain Blaine Maus presented the puck to Stewart in the dressing room.

Columbus goalie Pete Meehan had 23 saves in the opposing net. Norwood netminder Tom Smelstor left no doubt that he is one of the best in the tourney as he posted another shutout. The key of the game may have been in the early minutes of the first period when with the score deadlocked Columbus ace check Dawicki broke in all alone on the Norwood goalie, but Smelstor came up with a great glove save to stop him in his

time Twomey was a bull on defense and broke up several Columbus two on one breaks and also threw out a couple of brushing body checks that sent the opposing forwards reeling. The Norwood second wave of Bob Donahue, Bill Crowley, with Pete Oberlander and Hehner and Crowley splitting the third position, was a fire and kept the puck in the opposition's zone most of the time.

The first period was fairly even with each goalie making five saves. Columbus had the big break at the three-minute mark when Smelstor gloved Dickie's breakthrough shot.
