Former Fireman Nabbed In N. J.

The arrest of a Norwood man in Fort Lee, New Jersey, early last Saturday morning in what police claim was the deliberate act of setting fire to an automobile, may lead to the solution of the setting of several fires in one of the apartments at the Windsor Gardens complex, where the man, his wife and two children have lived since last September.

Free in \$10,000 bail in the New Jersey city and awaiting Grand Jury action there is the Norwood resident and former lieutenant of the Lee fire department for 4 years, Donald Robert Frankland, 30, of 401 Engamore Lane, scene of several fires in recent months that caused an estimated \$6,000 damage.

Frankland, who has been under surveillance by the Norwood Police and Fire departments for several weeks on an around-the-clock basis, was caught in the act of setting fire to an automobile in the rear of an apartment block at 215 Washington Avenue in Fort Lee at 2:00 a.m. last Saturday morning. Fort Lee police charge.

His dramatic arrest came in the morning and put him to bed at night, Chief Murphy said, "but he was under constant surveillance here and local police on several occasions concerning the fires that had been set in store rooms and refuse places in the Engamore apartments where he lived."
