Liquor Rules For Memorial Day Listed

The attention of Local Licensing Authorities, Police Officials, and all licensees for the sale of alcoholic beverages is called by the ABC to the provisions of the Liquor Control Act insofar as they relate to the sale and delivery of alcoholic beverages on Memorial Day, Monday, May 30, which is a legal holiday in Massachusetts.

Hotels, Restaurants, Taverns and Clubs shall not re-open for the sale of alcoholic beverages before 1:00 o'clock p.m.

"Package Goods" Stores shall not sell alcoholic beverages at any time during the day.

Manufacturers and Wholesalers and Importers shall make no sales or deliveries at any time during

Increased By 50% In Ten Years

Norwood experienced its greatest growth in history during the ten-year period from 1950 to '960, according to census figures released today which showed that Norwood's population increased by one half during that time, jumping from 16,636 to 24,-907.

Norwood spurted ahead of Dedham in the population race and now stands as the largest town in the immer'ate area.

Only Needham showed slightly larger growth than did Norwood. That town went from 16,316 to 25,635 during the same decade,

Westwood's population nearly doubled to a 1960 figure of 10,332.

In releasing the population count for the Norfolk County towns under his jurisdiction, Nathaniel Tilden, Supervisor of the incy Federal Census Office, said that these figures must be regarded as "unofficial" at this
