WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—Petroleum Administrator Likes said today he could "not safely recommend" increased gasoline allocations to the area farther than gasoline.

**Potatoes In Disappearing Act Here**

Norwood's potatoes, like most of the garden, have gone to war and will be a scarce commodity for some time to come. The gradual depletion of consumer supplies, which started weeks ago, has reached a stage where the once plentiful potato will now assume a most-valuable vegetable role on the family table.

The disappearance is due mainly to the boys having for the armed forces and for lend-lease shipments. Talk about farmers holding back supplies for higher prices, as is labelled as unfairness for the fourth of the matter is a Hollywood "hoax."
