New Dimout Rules Permit Wider Window Openings

Windows in a home may be opened half way either from the top or bottom, or a quarter way each, for an hour after sunset and half hour before sunrise, according to revised dimout regulations issued yesterday afternoon following a conference between Army, police and civilian defense officials at Boston Police Headquarters. Current regulations will continue to be enforced, effecting all homes, stores and business establishments. In keeping with the Summer season, extending through Oct. 1, outdoor carnivals and bazaars will be permitted to use 48-watt lights, 50 feet apart and shielded. The same rules apply to outdoor markets. There shall be no ornamental lights for any purpose. Porch lamps will be confined to 15-watt bulbs, shielded.

Italian Forces Give Up Pantelleria
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, June 11 (AP)—Allied headquarters announced today that the Italian island of Pantelleria had surrendered and was being occupied by Allied forces. "This surrender is the result of a period of continuous and intense bombardment, supported by naval bombardment," a special communique said. "The previous offers of surrender made to the commander were ignored."

Miners' Fine May Cause New Strike
WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—A powder keg atmosphere hung over the nation's coal fields today as government fines on miners for their last walkout brought threats of a new strike. War Labor Board cohesiveness toward a wage increase agreement between the United Mine Workers and a Pennsylvania group of operators contributed also to the newness of the situation.

New Walkout Hits Output of Tires
PHOENIX, O., June 11 (AP)—A walkout by 35 tire head builders at the General Tire & Rubber Co. started the layoff of several hundred other workers. A spokesman for the concern declared the work stoppage would halt "more than half of General's operations" if it is not ended immediately.

Reqs Hurl Back Donets Thrust
LONDON, June 11 (AP)—Another German thrust probing Russian defenses on the Donets river front near Lisichansk has been rebuffed, the Russians said today. The Soviet communique contained the reference to action west of Rostov, where the midnight communique had reported 300 German planes in a sudden strong lunge eastward.
