## Selectmen Withdraw Auto Sales License

Following a five-minute executive session with Town Counsel Walter J. Gotovich Tuesday, the Norwood Selectmen voted unanimously on the motion of Martin J. Lydon to withdraw the Class II license issued earlier to Norwood Auto Discount, Inc.

In offering the motion, Lydon stated that the license had been secured through misrepresentation by the applicant, Norman J. Urann. Urann had been granted the license as president of the corporation, and investigation showed that a second party, Karl A. Jackson of Dover, is actually president.

Urann stated that he had not been aware of this and referred to name him as president immediately, to correct the error, thereby making the license void.

"The application had been submitted before the corporation had been set up," pleaded Attorney Noble of Auto Discount. Selectman Charles L. Rich stated that he was unable to understand how Urann had been unaware that he was not president of the corporation since papers had been filed May 21st.

Prior to the vote by the Board, Chairman Harry Butters had stated that "as far as I am concerned there is no license there. The correct name of the president should have been included in the corporation, and as far as I am concerned there is no recourse." Urann observed that the vote constituted a stiff penalty for a "typographical error," pointing out that the corporation stood to lose its inventory in addition to a 5-year lease already signed. "This will total some \$33,000," he said, adding that the lease had hinged on the license being granted.

Other Auxiliary members elected to State-wide office included Chaplain Mrs. Mary Hodge of New Bedford, Conduetress Gladys Stahre of Watertown, Secretary Margaret O'Connor of Framingham, Treasurer Ann Coutte of Taunton, Inside Guard Hazel Huff of Boston, Outside Guard Margaret Malone of Quincy, and Trustees Nancy Marclain of Weymouth, Irene Crean of Westfield and Patricia Blenis of Rockland.

Past Worthy President James Bailey of Rockland presided over the Convention Banquet and assisted in the convention program. Meetings to discuss the numerous charitable works of the Eagles and plans for additional programs highlighted the weekend convention.

## Dedication Planned At Ellis Gardens Monday

The Recreational Department today announced that Norwood playgrounds will open for the season next Monday morning. Supervised activities will be at the regular locations where they have been held in recent years, and in addition supervision will be provided at two new areas. These are at the Oldham School area and at the New Recreational Department area at Ellis Gardens.

Dedication exercises at the Ellis Gardens Playground will be held at 11:00 a.m. next Monday with invitations extended to the Board of Selectmen as Recreation Commissioners for Norwood, to the Selectmen's Recreation Advisory Committee, the Conservancy Commission, the Ellis Gardens Association, and to the general public. Ellis Gardens Playground is the latest Recreation Department development for use as a play area and the first since Pleasant Park was developed several years ago.

Playgrounds will be opened this year at the following School Department areas: Prescott, Callahan, Cleveland, Shattuck, Winslow, as well as the new Oldham Park. They will be opened at the following Recreation Department areas: Endean, Elliot Park, Wilson Street, Father McAlister's, Pleasant Park, Boarder street, the Recreation Center, as well as Ellis Gardens. This provides a suitable play area for every Norwood boy and girl within reasonable walking distance of his home.

The playground season will extend from next Monday through Thursday, August 26, with playgrounds open each week Monday through Friday. Morning sessions are from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and afternoon sessions from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. A complete program of activities is planned for each area with activities to attract all age groups of boys and girls. There will also be the usual special features, such as the Pet Show, work or individual who is replaced by a proper heater.

## Sharon Set To Mark 200th Anniversary Over July 4

The schedule for the first commemorative events marking Sharon's 200th birthday will be on the Fourth of July weekend was released this week by the Bicentennial Committee.

The three-day program will open with a "Dime a Dip" supper at the First Baptist Church in Sharon at 5:30 p.m. Later in the evening, the Sharon Square will be closed to traffic and at 7:50 p.m. the pealing of the church bells will sound the call for the formal opening ceremonies on the Unitarian church grounds, Sharon's historic old village green.

Saturday, July 3, the celebration will continue with a bean supper being served at the Unitarian church grounds from 5 to 7 p.m. at which the George Baley Jazz Combo will entertain. At 8 p.m. the twelve piece band will play an old-fashion band concert.

The Sharon Bicentennial Parade will conclude the weekend events on Sunday, July 4. At 1:30 p.m. the parade will step off from the Sharon High School, continue to the Sharon Square, and to the Sacred Heart Field where the floats will be placed on view. "Floats" from over 100 Sharon organizations will be coordinated with those entered from surrounding towns and dispersed between a bevy of bands from as far away as Rhode Island. Other parade participants will be antique cars, clowns, color guards, with marching units from Fort Devens and the Navy Yard plus two dozen equestrians and several pony riders. ## Chief Dobson Warns On New Heater Laws

Owners of space heaters in Massachusetts were alerted at the monthly meeting of the Massachusetts Fire Chiefs' Association last week. Norwood Fire Chief Irving J. Dobson cautioned that any oil supply tank closer than 42 inches, will be unlawful to use after July 1st and must be replaced by a proper heater.

Improper maintenance and control of space heaters and other heating systems has, over the past years, contributed greatly to the large number of dwelling house fires, Chief Dobson said.

The chief estimated all home owners in Norwood to have their heating systems completely checked and serviced at least once a year. This service should be performed by an accredited service company or individual who is licensed to perform such work, he asserted.

## Playmates' Carnival To Aid Muscular Dystrophy

The children aged the Cottage street area are busy filling their days with plans for a neighborhood carnival to help Muscular Dystrophy victims. The carnival will be held Thursday, July 1, at 103 Cottage street.

The children get the idea for staging their festival while watching TV personality, Rex Trailer, who is promoting such carnivals for Muscular Dystrophy on his "Boontown" show on WBZ. Last year, in cooperation with the Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, more than 12,000 carnivals were held by children across the country. Over \$100,000 was raised for research and patient service programs.
