In Pairs skating, David Bassinari and Diane Kern did not skate because they will be defending their National titles. Michael Jacques and Nancy Jo Johnson are defending their Regional title, but Alan Welch and Linda Gay of Roll-Land took the State title.

Norfolk Aggie Accepting 13th Year Enrollees

Norfolk County Agricultural High School, 460 Main street, Walpole, is still accepting applications for enrollment in the 13th Year Advanced Certificate Courses for the 1965-66 school year until July 20. Three major courses are offered:

- Ornamental Horticulture, which consists of Plant Science and Floral Design. There will be a great deal of emphasis on floral design so that the graduate can do design work in a flower shop.
- Forestry and Wildlife Management. This course consists of Wildlife study, Game Management, and Arboriculture. The graduate can obtain employment with tree companies where pruning, spraying and removal work is done.
- Agricultural Mechanics include the operation, maintenance and repair of agricultural and industrial tractors; small gasoline engines, earth-mooving equipment and both oxy-acetylene and arc welding. Graduates will be qualified to operate, service and maintain earth-moving equipment, or work in shops repairing and maintaining equipment.

A high school diploma or its equivalent is necessary for entrance. The tuition is free for residents of Norfolk County.

Norwood Nine Wins Finale Over Milton

Norwood ended the season on a winning note by topping Milton, 3-1, at the Milton High School Field Tuesday with Elaine Maus pegging a three-hitter.

At Brintree last Friday it was a different story as Charley Hopkins lost another tough game on the mound by a score of 6-4 as Richy Heber belted a home run to pace the Norwood attack. The Norwood record for the season was 8 wins and 10 losses with a losing percentage of .556.

NORWOOD 3, MILTON 1

In the Milton game, Norwood scored two runs in the first frame and added a single in the second, with Milton getting their only run of the game in the first on a round tripper by Richard. Norwood opened the second on a Vito Anello lined a single to left. With Richy Santopago reached on an error by the first baseman, with both moving up to second, the second time Charley Hopkins came through on a clutch single to center, scoring Anello and Santopago with what proved to be enough runs to win.

Charley Hopkins made the play of the game in the fifth when he made a leaping catch of a hard liner by Paul Kersey. Norwood had a pair of hits in the fourth by Rick Holmes and Blaine Maus, but the runners were left stranded. In the sixth, Lanzoni got a clean single and stole second and third but couldn't score. It was a great end to the Norwood season with Maus in control all the way to gain his second win of the season.

This was another heart breaker for the locals as Charley Hopkins deserved a better fate. With the score tied 4-4, Brintree got two in the sixth on three infield hits to pull it lead in the second on a single by pitcher John Diaute, driving in Tom Semino.

In the 3rd Norwood went ahead 2-1 as Paul Angelo tripled to deep left and Richy Heber belted a home run over the school in right for his fourth round tripper of the year. Brintree then pulled ahead 3-2 in the 4th with Lueders. Norwood fought back to take a 4-3 lead in the 8th with Heber and Richy Santopago singing and Vito Anello going driving them both in with a line double to left.

VA Newsletter

Veterans getting special pensions for nonservice-connected disabilities that make continual assistance necessary may request invalid lifts

as well as some therapeutic and rehabilitative devices to use in their homes or other places of treatment, the Veterans Administration said today.

Invalid lifts are hydraulic devices which can elevate or lower feeble veterans in and out of beds, chairs, bathtubs, etc., VA explained. These devices will be issued by VA to assist wives and family members who care for helpless veterans when they are hospitalized at a VA hospital or domiciliary.

Massachusetts veterans who are entitled should write the Boston, VA Outpatient Clinic and include a statement from their personal physician that the lift or other equipment is needed medically for the patient's care and treatment.

Custom-fitted devices, such as artificial limbs or braces, medical supplies and minor personal items of equipment, which could not reasonably be reclaimed and issued to another patient, may be issued to the veteran on a permanent basis, VA said.
