\$4,000 Loot Taken, Homes Ransacked In Breaks Here

Furs, Jewelry And Cash Stolen From Apartment

Three Norwood families have been victimized by intruders who invaded their premises while they were away on vacation, police here reported.

A thief who is believed to have used a pass key, entered the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. George Elias at 2 Weld avenue and carried off more than \$4,000 worth of furs, jewelry and cash. The Elias' were away on a three-day vacation at the time.

Two other house breaks, on Altemarle road, are also still under investigation by police where a juvenile has admitted entering the homes and causing extensive damage.

The break at the Elias home was discovered last Friday night on their return from vacation.

Patrolman Richard Towne, called to the ransacked home by the occupants, found no visible means of entry. A state police expert was called to take fingerprints throughout the apartment.

Mr. and Mrs. Elias reported the loss of a pink jacket valued at \$2,000, about \$1,000 in cash which was in various budget envelopes, some costume jewelry and a silver tray, all valued at about \$4,000.

On checking the home, the owners discovered that two pillow cases were missing and it is theorized by police that they were used to cart away the loot.

27 Alarms Keep Firemen Busy During Week

The Norwood Fire Department for the week just ended recorded a total of 27 alarms, most of which were for grass fires.

One of the alarms early in the period was for the rescue of a 31-year-old child who had caught his head in a gate at 72 Borwood drive. Ladder and rescue equipment were used to free the child, who had the Greely woman as a passenger; Ralph J. Girouard is the child's father.

On July 8 an electrical fire at the Civic Building caused heavy smoke to fill the area around the swimming pool. Smoke ejectors quickly cleared the area. Little fire damage resulted.

A breakdown of the 27 alarms for the week showed 12 for grass fires, six for auto and truck fires, two electrical, one house, one store, two false alarms, and two for administering oxygen, in addition to the rescue.

36 Report For Boys' Drum Corps

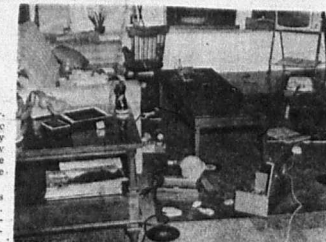
Last Thursday night 36 Norwood boys met at the Civic Center for the preliminary meeting to organize a new drum and bugle corps for the town. Various problems were discussed and cleared up.

The corps is to include boys from the age of 12 to 21 years. No experience will be necessary in either musical instruments or marching. All instruction of the instruments and the marching will be arranged for by the corps. In addition, the corps will furnish all instruments and uniforms once they are ready for them.

Members will pay a dollar a week to meet the expenses of the instructors. Should a family have more than two boys interested in joining the corps, their dues will not exceed two dollars weekly.

Tentative plans call for practice sessions on Monday and Thursday nights, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at either the Elks Park or the K. of C. parking lot.

Post 70 Awarded Trophy Local Delegates Back From Legion Conclave

Headed by Post 70 Commander George Ellegood, delegates from the local Legion Post returned to Norwood on Saturday evening at the conclusion of their 47th convention held at Northampton. The Norwood delegates participated in Norfolk County caucus meetings and business sessions as well as elections at department levels.

Post 70 was awarded a first place trophy for its activities in the field of community services for 1964-1965 in district 6 (Norfolk County).

Elected to top county posts were County Commander John Murphy of Dedham Post 18, and Senior Vice Commander Robert Leo Eng, of Quincy Post 85.

Ronald Alexander, Child Welfare, S.A.L. Chairman, and East Commander of Post 70 was honored by being named Sgt.-at-Arms for Norfolk County by Commander Murphy. Perhaps for the first time in the Legion's history, two department Vice Commanders from District 6 vied for the top state Legion post.

The narrow margin of victory by Department Commander George Slitt over Paul Hunt by 17 votes is an indication of the high esteem in which both of these men are held by fellow Legionnaires.
