Sees 2 1/2 Million Maintenance Bill For School Plant

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Philip O. Coakley shocked the Norwood Selectmen Tuesday when he estimated that some \$400,000 more will be necessary to bring the \$12 million plus Norwood Public School plant "up to snuff." He further estimated that some \$100-\$120,000 will be required annually for regular maintenance.

The meeting of the two Boards had been scheduled on the meeting of John A. Abdallah for a discussion of the maintenance budget.

While the two Boards bickered for some time over the interpretation of the Town Charter with regard to school maintenance and supplies, it appears that effort is being made to establish a joint effort for completing the necessary work over a seven-year period.

Charles L. Rich moved that Town Council Walter J. Gotovich submit an interpretation of the prerogatives of the Town Fathers regarding maintenance and supplies for schools.

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Expect Pupil Count To Rise Beyond '70

A comprehensive report by the School Department of all pertinent data to be studied for future public school housing needs in Norwood anticipates that the Norwood school population will not level off until after 1970. Supt. Dr. Philip O. Coakley reported at an earlier meeting of the School Committee that he had expected by 1970 Norwood's schools would reach their maximum enrollment, but in his latest report, completed the week of the "Permanent School Housing Study Committee, school population figures will continue to rise beyond that date. School enrollment, usually indicates about 25 percent of the population of a given town.

A new junior high school is imperative, the superintendent announced by 1967, there will be a shortage of 30 classrooms in this area—7½ at the present junior high level, and 22½ more at the grade level.

The Norwood School Committee has recommended that a new elementary school and a new addition to the senior high, as well as a new junior high, be added to the school plant.
