Norwood Nationals Defeat Watertown East Nine, 3-1

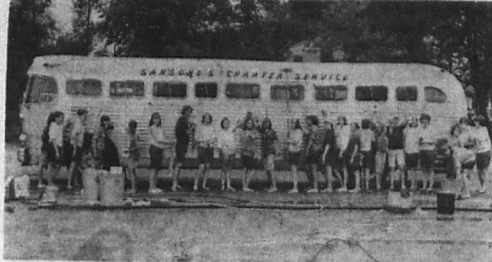

Towns In Met Water District Requested To Cut Down On Use

Commissioner Howard Whitmore, Jr. of the Metropolitan District Commission has announced that due to the continuing lack of rain, resulting in extremely heavy demands on the Commission's water distribution facilities it has become necessary to request residents of cities and towns which obtain all or a portion of their water supply from the M.D.C., including Norwood to reduce voluntarily their water consumption as much as possible until further notice.

Although there is an ample supply of water available in the Quabbin and Wachusett Reservoirs, the M.D.C.'s two principal storage reservoirs, to meet the requirements of the Metropolitan Water District for more than two years, the demand on aqueduct and distribution facilities during the past few weeks has been so heavy.

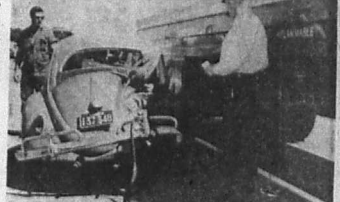
