## Undefeated Nine Set To Face Hyde Park Sunday

The Norwood All Stars sponsored by Colombo's Star ship won a big one as they got five runs in the top of the fifth to support Billy Travers. 4 hit 13 strikeout performance and knocked a tough North Attleboro team 5-1 at the latter's field Wednesday night. On Tuesday it was a no contest game with Norwood coming out on top of Westwood 2-0 with ten-year-old Chris Dixon firing a no-hitter and Brian Donelan pacing the offense with 4 hits including a round-tripper.

no out. Travers was forced at third for the first out but then John DeCosta and Charley Little rapped consecutive doubles and it was Norwood in command 3-0.

Up stepped Greg Lang and the big boy lined the first pitch over the right center field fence and it was a 5-0 Norwood lead.

North Attleboro got one back in the top of the sixth on a single by Ripley and a double by Davignon but this was all for the home team as Travers bore down and struck out the last two batters to end the game. It is a beautiful field at North Attleboro and the club is a big team showing excellent fielding but it was just too much Travers, Lang, Little and company.

DeCosta and Little paced the Norwood attack with a pair of doubles and on the fielding side it was Bill Porcello in left and Johnny Lynch behind the plate who were the solid glove men.
